STATEMENT BY **BAKHTIAR TALHAH,** PRESIDENT OF THE MALAYSIAN AIDS COUNCIL

Malaysia is committed to End AIDS by 2030 as stated in the 2016 United Nations General Assembly Political Declaration on Ending AIDS, that aims to:

- a) Reduce new HIV infections to fewer than 500 000 globally by 2020
- b) Reduce AIDS-related deaths to fewer than 500 000 globally by 2020
- c) Eliminate HIV-related stigma and discrimination by 2020

The Malaysian AIDS Council (MAC) measured progress made in 2019 based on 4 main pillars of the MAC Strategic Plan as follows:

Strategy 1: Building a value and principle-driven organisation

Strategy 2: Providing leadership, political and organizational commitment to the AIDS response

Strategy 3: Community system strengthening

Strategy 4: Mobilising resources

In 2019, MAC officially became a member of Coalition PLUS, a global network of civil society that work on HIV/AIDS issues in over 50 countries. Through Coalition PLUS, MAC is now part of an international fraternity that supports key populations namely Men who have sex with men (MSM), Sex Workers (SW), People who inject drugs (PWID) and the Transgender community.

Under the theme 'Komuniti Membawa Perubahan', MAC was part of the national celebration of World AIDS Day 2019 officiated by the Deputy Minister Ministry of Health, Dr. Lee Boon Chye. The event on 1st December 2019 at Kinta River Walk, Ipoh gathered stakeholders from the Partner Organisations and related government agencies, and the public at large. 2019 also marked the year that Malaysia was recognised by the World Health Organisation (WHO) as the 12th country in the world and the first in the Asia Pacific that successfully eliminated mother-to-child transmission of HIV.



The National Strategic Plan on Ending AIDS 2016-2030 has provided a strategic framework to MAC and our partner organisations in delivering prevention programmes specifically for key populations in the country. In 2019 alone, more than 32 000 unique clients benefitted from services under the 'Differentiated HIV Services for Key Populations' (DHSKP). Additionally, engagement with stakeholders included activities such as community-based testing, the Klinik Kesihatan Model and also the establishment of the MAC Digital Team, which has tremendously upped the presence of MAC in social media and broadened our reach virtually.

Evidently, 2019 was a significant year for MAC. Our heartfelt thanks to all our funders, specifically the Malaysian AIDS Foundation, the Ministry of Health and the Global Fund, and our sincere appreciation to our Partner Organisations nationwide, who form the backbone of our efforts, in through their relentless work and dedication in providing services to the community.

And lastly, my personal thanks to the Executive Committee (2018-2020) for the solidarity in steering MAC during challenging times.

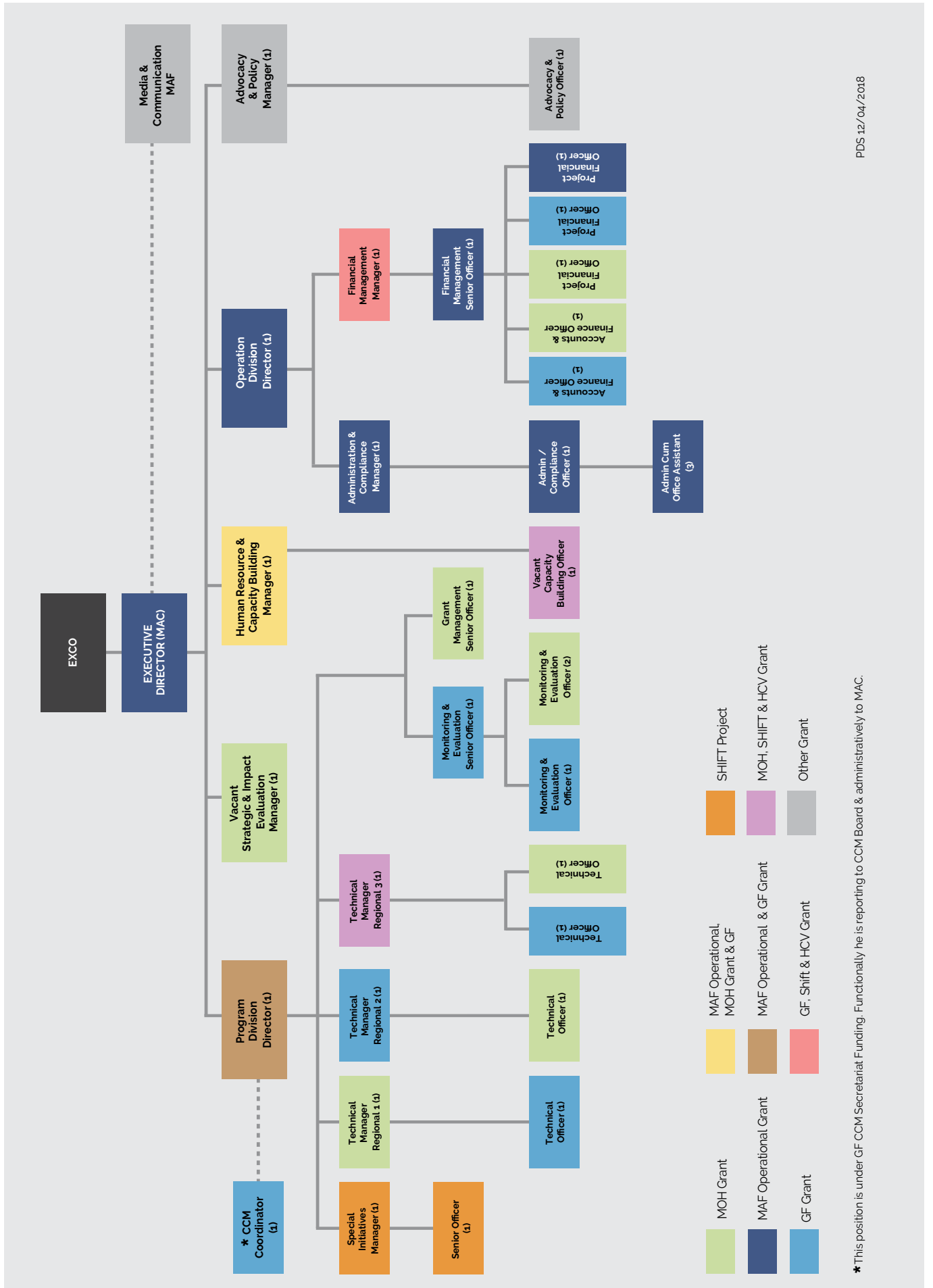

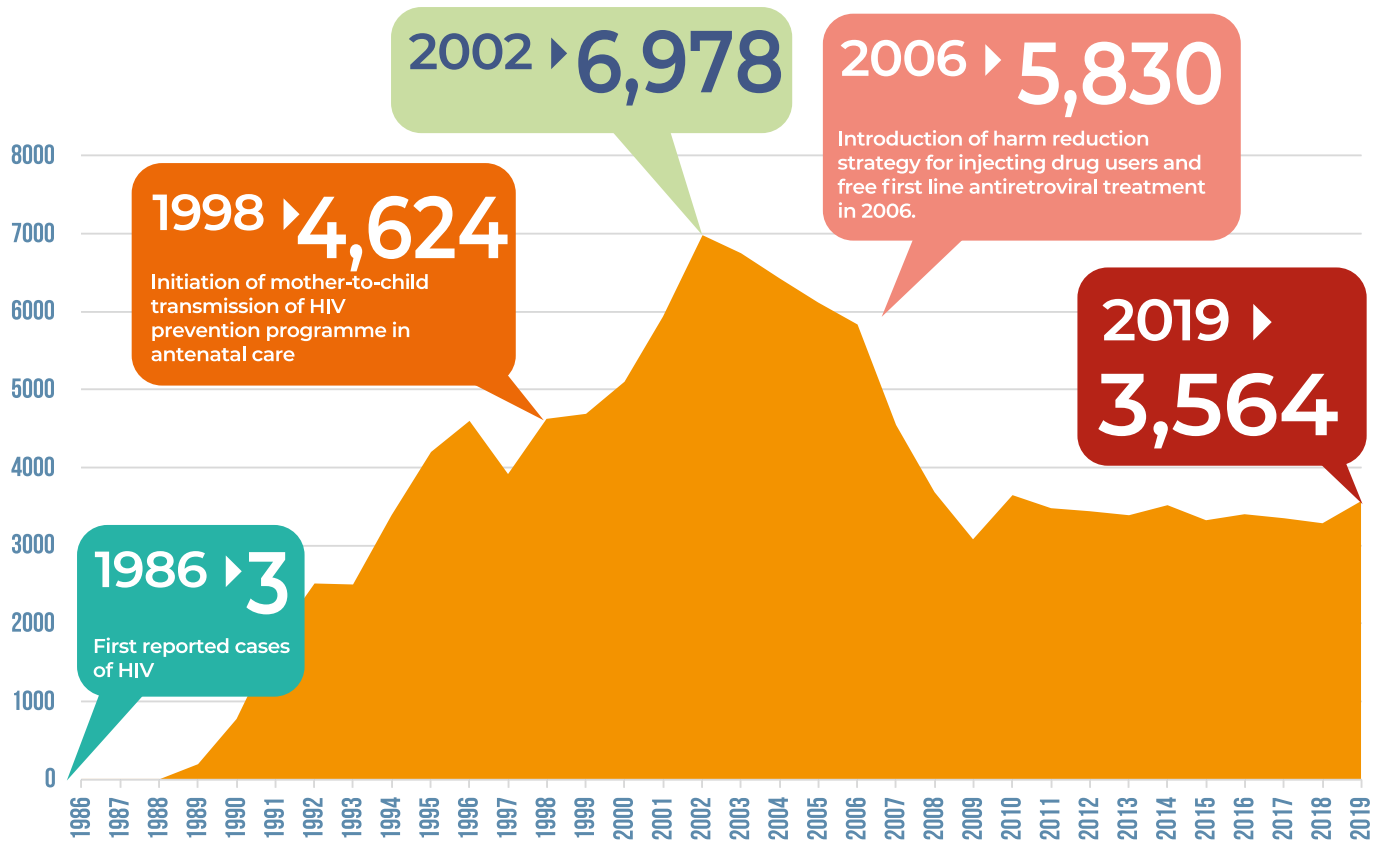

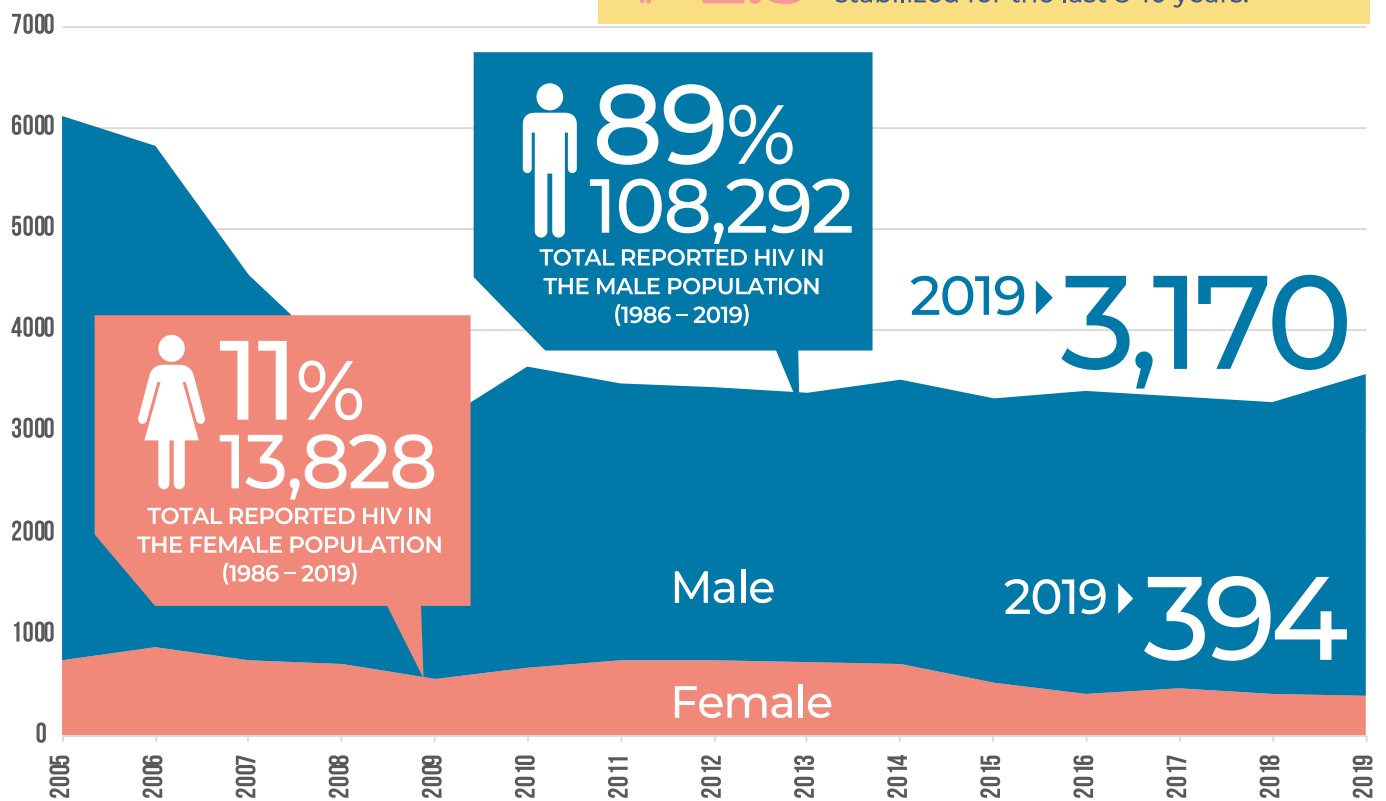

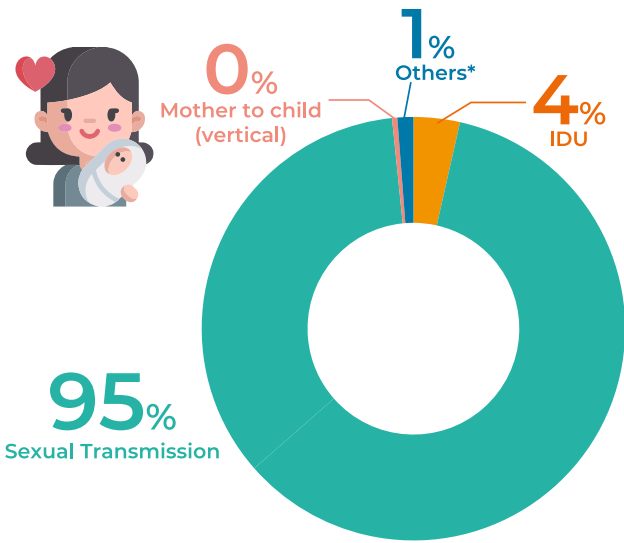
HIV TRANSMISSION BY GENDER IN 2019

Males continue to represent the majority of all HIV cases in Malaysia but prevalence rate among both sexes stabilized for the last 8-10 years.



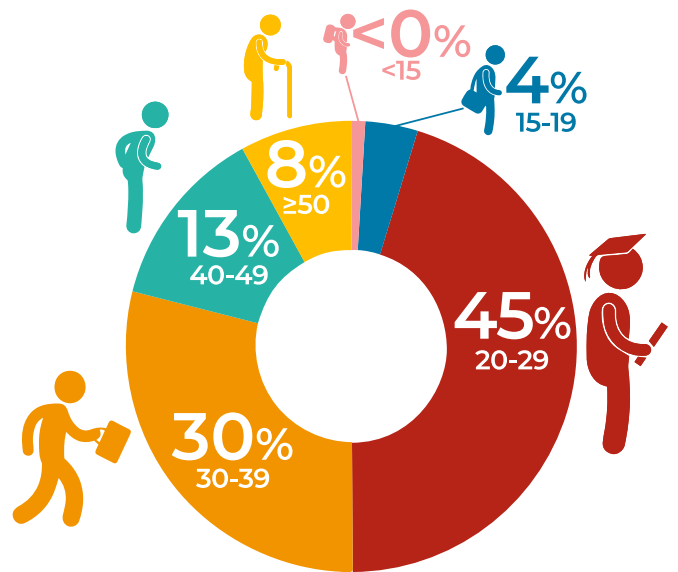
HIV TRANSMISSION BY RISK FACTOR IN 2019

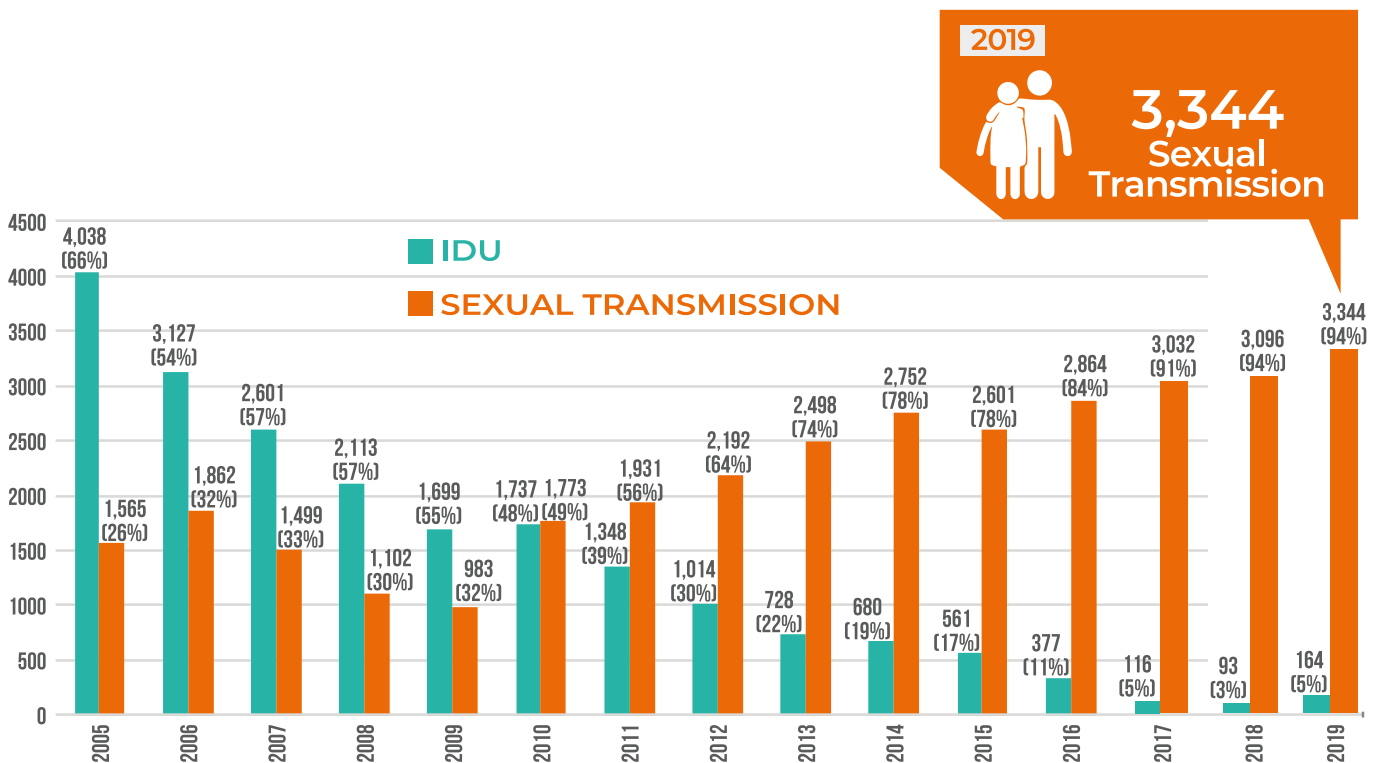

HIV TRANSMISSION BY AGE IN 2019

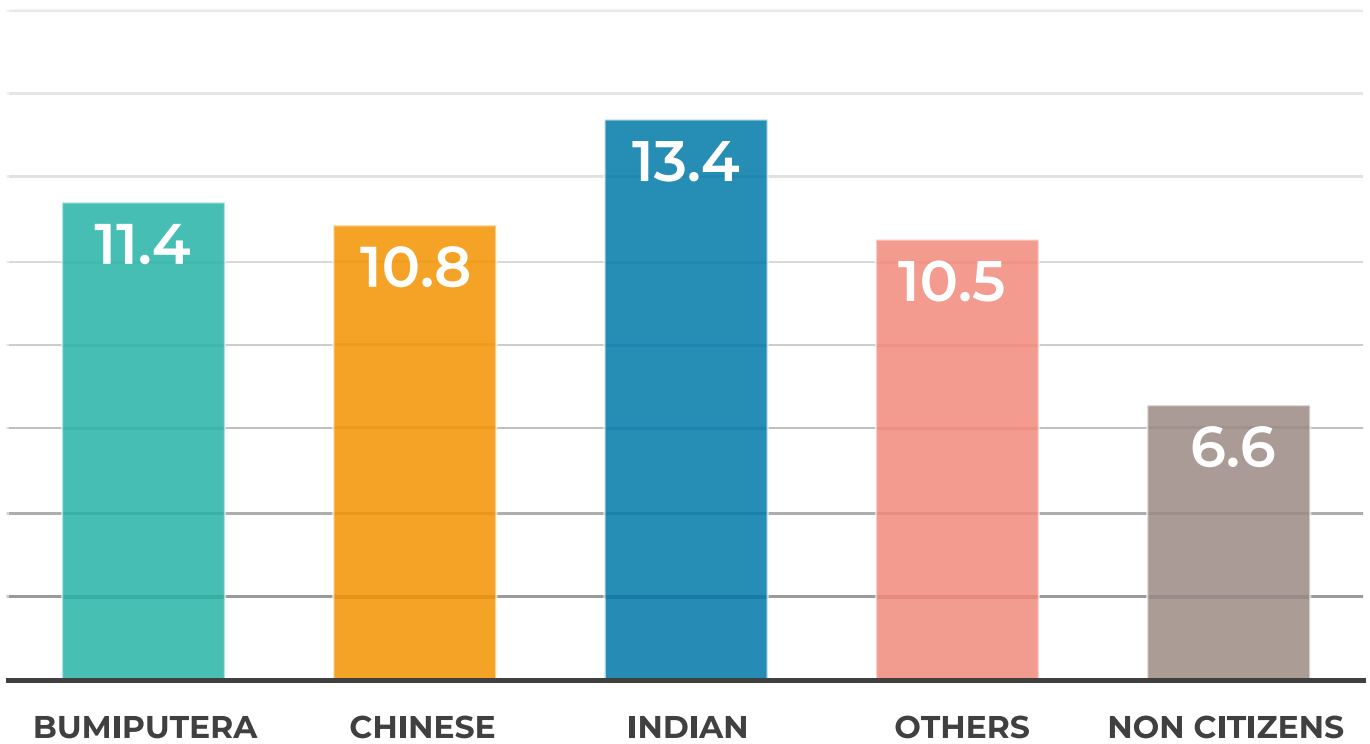

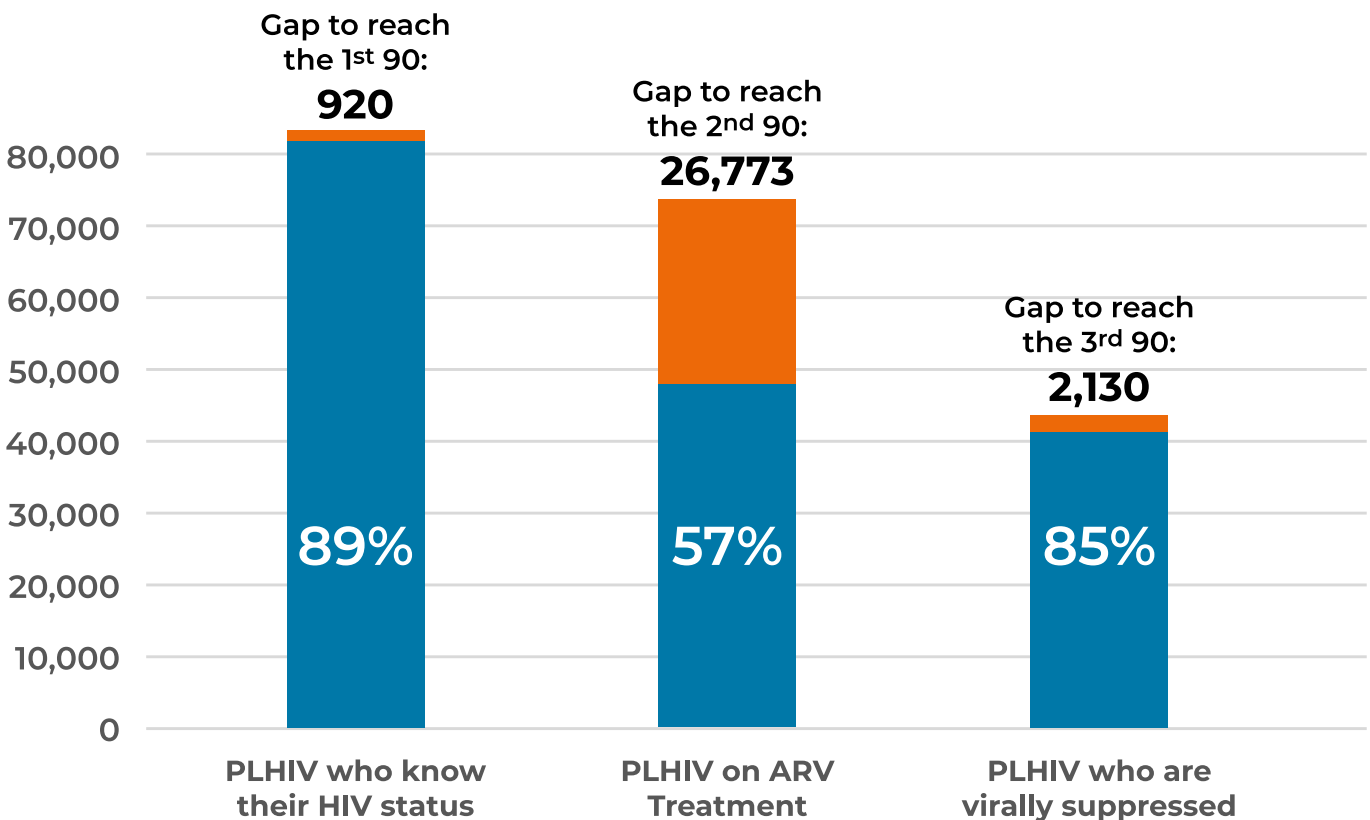

It is established with the principle in putting forward a community action in view to fight against AIDS and Hepatitis.

Their organization structure

It comprises of Board of members including 3 Exco members (President, Vice President, Treasurer) and 21 committee members. The Board oversee the Secretariat led by a General Director, which is located in Paris, Brussels, Geneva and Dakar.

The Board of members meet 4 times yearly for regular Board meeting ('Conseil Administration') and yearly Annual General Meeting (AGM).

6. American Caribbean Platform (Ecuador, Bolivia, Quebec, French Guyana, Martinique, Guadeloupe, Saint-Martin)

MALAYSIAN AIDS COUNCIL (MAC) ROAD TO BECOMING COALITION PLUS MEMBER



12 December 2018 – MAC officially became Coalition Plus observer member

As an observer organisation, MAC has the opportunity in learning about the alliance structure and the projects undertaken by Coalition Plus members.

Hence, MAC was invited to a few Coalition Plus Board Meeting held in July 2019 and November 2019.

Annual General Meeting (AGM) and Board Member Meeting on 6 - 7 July 2019

This was the first meeting where MAC was invited to and experienced the real taste of the functioning of the governing body of Coalition Plus.

This annual assembly presided by Mme Hakima Himmich, was attended by 4 Exco members and committee members representing each organisation member and observer.

It is organised in 3 segments: Discussion, AGM and Board member meeting with each consist respectively in thematic work group, regular annual report presentation and positioning paper discussion.

It was the moment when the Board Members welcomed MAC representative for the first time and the opportunity for us to showcase our worth through our governance, current and past community projects during a short slide presentation on the first day of this assembly.

Some of the major decisions made during this 2-day meeting were:

- Acceptance of ANCS (Senegal) as the new Coalition Plus member
- Coalition Plus affirmation in the fight against the drug. They were also informed about the updates on the proposed legal reform on drug decriminalisation in Malaysia.
- An observer organisation is required to attend all the 4 board meetings and AGM yearly as proven commitment from the candidate country to be Coalition Plus member.

Board Member Meeting on 9 - 10 November 2019

This meeting is hosted by ALCS, Coalition Plus founding member in Marrakech, Morocco. Representatives for MAC was President, Mr Bakhtiar Effendy Talhah and Senior Advocacy Officer, Mr Egha Elias.

Mission to MAC from 21 - 27 November 2019

This is the assessment visit carried out by the selected representatives from Coalition Plus Secretariat and organisation members before MAC is considered as Coalition Plus member.

The visit started on 21 November 2019 with the meeting at Malaysian AIDS Council office where the Management team of MAC had the opportunity to present to Coalition Plus delegates on the insight of our organisation structure, activities and the overview of the HIV response in Malaysia. It was also the moment for the two parties to share each other's experience and knowledge of the HIV epidemic and its impact on the key population in their countries.

The first day programme continued with the visit at SEED Foundation office where the delegates received a warmth welcome from the adorable SEED staff led by its Program Coordinator, Ms Jane Kasim who passionately walked them through SEED journey of becoming the prominent NGO for the transgender community welfare. The delegates seemed very interested by the briefing that they were exchanging questions in order to gain insightful information on what it takes to be a transgender person in Malaysia.

The day ended with the interesting presentation by Radzi, KLASS program manager who had charmed the delegates with his shyness while delivering a standard presentation on the organisation and its activities. Mr Guy Gagnon from COCQ-SIDA particularly was drawn to the narrative of KLASS as a well-established organisation in HIV care for MSM community in Malaysia.

The next day (22 November 2019) we went visiting the leading IDU based NGO in Klang Valley, Persatuan Insaf Murni Malaysia in Kajang. The programme started with the organisation presentation by Insaf Murni President, Dr Hj Mohd Khafidz followed by a mini tour in the 2-storey shop unit which house the administration office on the first floor and the Methadone clinic on the ground floor. The delegates experienced a hands-on learning when the President himself, gave out a dose of methadone to a few patients. It was equally a sharing moment for the delegates on the methadone therapy practice in their country.

In the afternoon, Coalition Plus delegates had a meeting with Exco members of MAC. It was the opportunity for them to dig deeper on the drive and mission of MAC in the national HIV intervention and safeguard of the marginalised community in Malaysia.

Then we flew over to Penang Island during the weekend. The delegates had benefited the sight, taste and sound of the island before embarking on the official programme. The first NGO visited was AARG at their base in the beautiful greenery of USM campus. We were welcomed by their dynamic team led by Mr Jega who presented us a comprehensive insight on AARG milestone in fighting against HIV among the IDU community in the Northern Perak state and Penang.

In the afternoon, we went to a shelter run by CASP, an exceptional NGO for PLHIV in Penang. The delegates attended a briefing given by the Exco member on the shelter and organisation in general. The delegates listened attentively to CASP representative voicing out their concern on the sustainability of the shelter. It was the time for the delegates to lend some ideas to respond to the concern.

Our last day in Penang on 26 November 2019, we visited another partner organisation, FHDA and our programme started at FHDA owned sexual reproductive health clinic. We were welcomed by the ever-bubbly Ms Christine, FHDA Programme Manager. She enthusiastically showed us around the premises and provided us with a concise briefing on the clinic operation.

We then headed to FHDA office where their programme staffs had already waited for us. We were then having a formal presentation by Ms Christine about the organisation and their impressive milestone in the sexual health reproductive area.

Back in Kuala Lumpur on 27 November 2019, we went to Positive Living shelter for PLHIV in Batu Arang, Selangor. The shelter was run by the daughter-father duo who take unconditional care for the sick and disable PLHIV.

Our programme ended with a meeting with MOH representative in Shah Alam where we were presented with an overview of the public health response to HIV in Malaysia.

It was the opportunity for both MOH and Coalition Plus representative to get to know each other and express their wishes for future collaboration through MAC definitely.

Strategy 2

Providing Leadership, Political & Organisational Commitment to the AIDS Response

World AIDS Day takes place on 1 December each year. It's an opportunity for people worldwide to unite in the fight against HIV, to show support for people living with HIV, and to commemorate those who lost their life from an AIDS-related illness. Founded in 1988, World AIDS Day was the first-ever global health day.



The national celebration of World AIDS Day 2019 was officiated by the Deputy Minister Ministry of Health, Dr. Lee Boon Chye on 1st December 2019 at Kinta River Walk, Ipoh, Perak. In this meaningful event, MOH and MAC reiterate that is essential in giving a better understanding of HIV/AIDS to the public and will work closely with the community on the fight against the epidemic. Echoing that, MAC President Bakhtiar Talhah reaffirmed the statement of MOH where only people in the community can assist the specific community. Additionally, to have a better working relationship with other NGO and Partner Organisations.







Strategy 3

Community Systems Strengthening

PREVENTION, TREATMENT, SUPPORT & CARE PROGRAMMES TARGETING KEY POPULATION (KP)

The National Strategic Plan on Ending AIDS 2016-2030 has been a strategic enabler in guiding the Malaysian AIDS Council (MAC) and its partner organizations in delivering high-impact prevention programmes for the key populations in the country. The ultimate goal of NSPEA is to track the HIV and AIDS response with the aim to reach the 90-90-90 targets introduced by UNAIDS (90% of key populations tested for HIV and know their status, 90% of PLHIV on ART and 90% of PLHIV on ART adhering to treatment with suppressed viral load). The NSPEA also aims to reach 80% of key populations (KPs) with effective prevention activities.



The overarching principle of the strategies and resulting interventions is to establish a continuum of prevention, treatment and care services.

In year 2018, combinations of cost-effective, evidence based, and scalable interventions were directed to the KPs in geographic areas where HIV prevalence was evident. Classified as a country with a concentrated HIV epidemic, the KPs show a high infection rate of above 5% especially people who inject drugs, men who have sex with men, sex workers and transgender population while the infection rate among the general population is estimated to be less than 0.5%.

The aim in 2019 remained to crafting effective linkages to HIV prevention, case, treatment and support services with the emphasis to identify as many people as possible with HIV early in their infection and link them successfully to prevention, care and treatment services and to link those who test negative to prevention services.

DIFFERENTIATED HIV SERVICES FOR KEY POPULATIONS (DHSKP)

In 2019, Ministry of Health (MOH) is adopting the new model in line with the Global Fund new model which is Differentiated HIV Services for Key Populations (DHSKP). Most of the projects from MOH funds were transitions into the new model DHSKP for 2019 funding period.



The Differentiated service delivery provides multiple options for clients based on client's needs at every stage of the HIV service continuum. Unlike previous model which were divided by multiple projects such as Treatment Adherence Peer Support Programme (TAPS), HIV Continuum Of Care Home, Prevention Of HIV Through Injecting Drug Use with Needle and Syringe Exchange Programme (NSEP) and Prevention Of HIV Through Sexual Transmission amongst Sex Workers, Transgender & Men Who Have Sex With Men Population, the DHSKP model combined all the projects together with three implementation modalities as below:

- **NGO-based with close KK collaboration**
- **KK-model with NGO involvement**
- **KK-based without NGO involvement**

There are 49 projects were approved by MOH in 2019 and 14 projects were transition into DHSKP. There are also 11 DHSKP projects were approved by Global Funds in 2019.

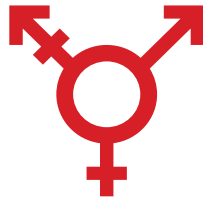

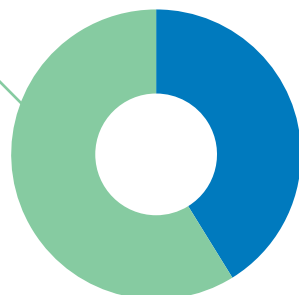

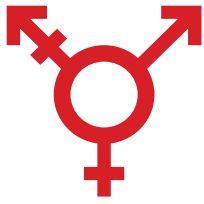

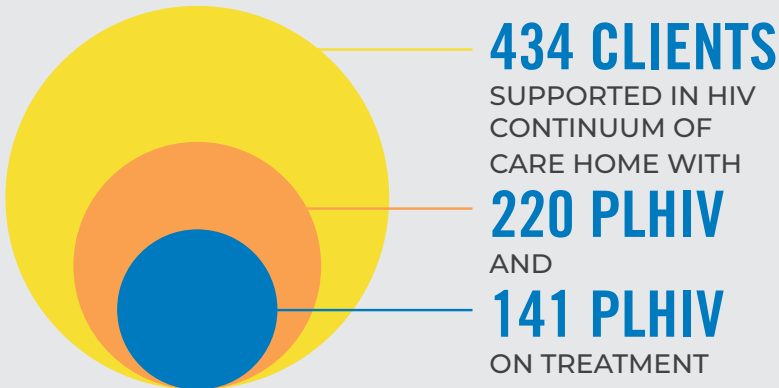

BEST PRACTICES

COMMUNITY BASED TESTING (CBT)



Community-Based Testing (CBT) was introduced in partnership with the Ministry of Health Malaysia to complement the existing healthcare provider-initiated HIV testing and counselling by providing HIV testing and counselling to KPs outside of healthcare settings.

HIV testing and counselling is a critical gateway to prevention, care and treatment. By adopting a community-based approach, social, structural and logistical barriers that impede access to and uptake of HIV testing and counselling are effectively eliminated.

Outreach/case workers from Partner Organisations were trained on the ethics of HIV testing and counselling as well as on how to encourage referrals to HIV related prevention, treatment, care and support services. With CBT, HIV testing is now more accessible especially to those who do not access mainstream health services. CBT was implemented at the sites on August 2017, and in 2019, the number of CBT done was over 4,000.

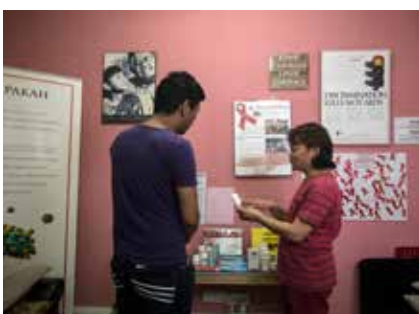
KK MODEL – EXPANDING PROJECTS UNDER KK BASED

The pilot for Klinik Kesihatan Model was initiated in 2015. The first Klinik Kesihatan was Klinik Kesihatan Kuala Sg. Baru located in Melaka. In 2019, this model was expanded to 23 Klinik Kesihatan to aim for a sustainable and cost-effective model, designed to increase Key Populations access to health services through development of partnership agreements between the Government and Non-governmental body.

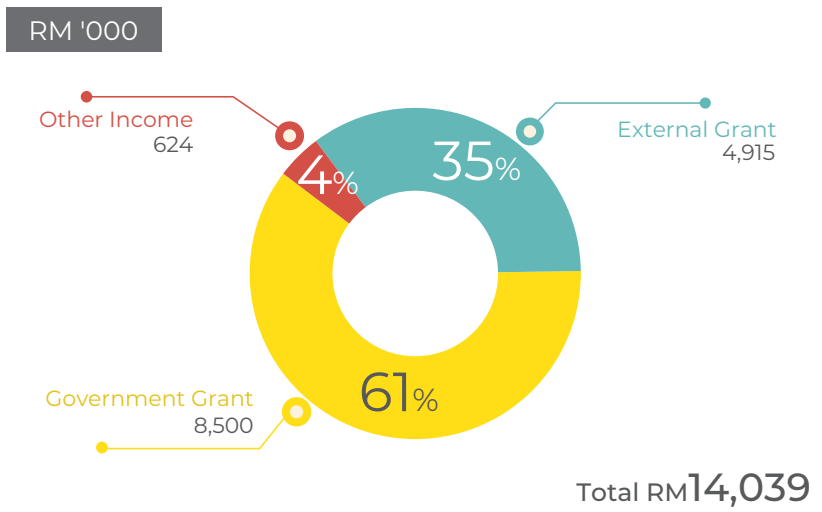
New apps have been included on the website where public can search and directly contact to our outreach worker (we called as Community Health Service Navigator) to get tested.

During the World AIDS Day celebrations, the team managed to get public to share a message through the media social by posting some meaningful words on a prepared placard. This trend is successful as a lot of people interested to join with no stigma towards HIV/AIDS key messages.

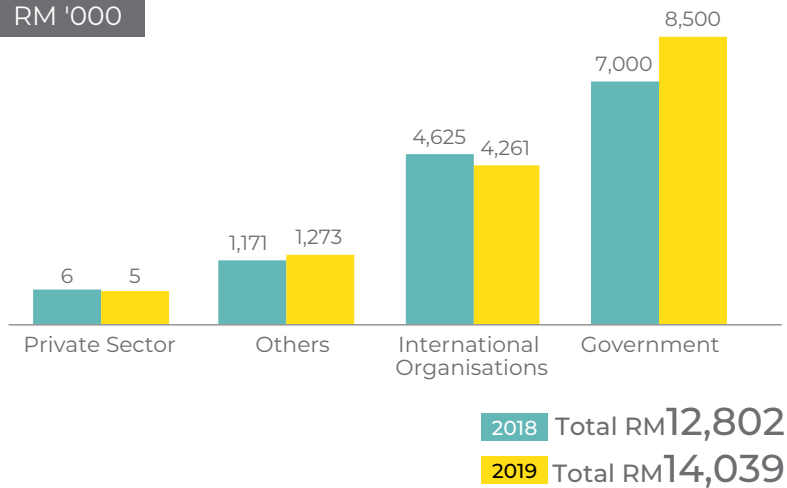

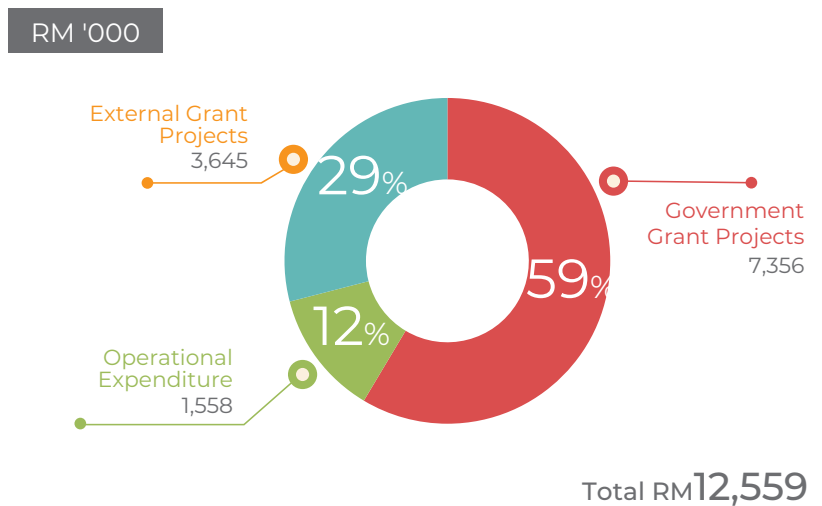
